The 2008-2009 Student Government Association is proud to share its accomplishments for the Fall 2008 semester; a semester in which we have reconnected with our fellow students and regained their trust. In our early stages we were told that it couldn't be done and that our vision was naïve. We have answered back. This is what our SGA stands for: a mentality that promotes challenge, hard work and resilience, and a sense that opportunities are out there waiting for us and that we shall embrace them.

We represent and serve UTEP students and work to ensure that students participate in the University's decision-making process. We defend the rights of each student and work towards the advancement of the UTEP Community. In this vision, SGA members are committed to the ideals of excellence and integrity, and accept a strict standard of accountability for organizational effectiveness.

A new cycle began with the 2008-2009 SGA after taking office on June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008. We have prospered in the development of a strong team of student leaders. We have engaged in active service, promoted greater student participation at all campus events and have contributed our talents and enthusiasm to the excitement of campus life. Having successfully completed our first semester of work, the 2008-2009 SGA Administration is off to a great start.

In order to ensure student participation in the decision making process, we have dramatically increased student participation on Faculty Senate Committees. There had been no students appointed to any of these important committees in more than two years. In addition, students are being represented and becoming involved in other ways, such as being part of our different Ad-Hoc Committees, and becoming involved in project committees pertaining to Incidental Fees, oversight of the Swimming and Fitness Center, Shuttle Services, Follet-Bookstore Buy-Back Program, Sodexo Food Services, Disabled Students Services, printing of the University Catalogs and course schedules, and more.

SGA has worked to promote student life by participating in New Student Orientations, reviving and revamping the Excel Program (in which 25 freshman students participate actively in SGA), recycling, promoting UTEP athletic games and events, Bhutan Festival, Welcome Back Week, Midnight Breakfast, the UTEP-UACJ Student Panel, and Secret Santa.

During our first semester we have also sponsored and co-sponsored events such as Voter Registration Drives, a Voice Your Choice Debate between Dee Margo and Joe Moody, Minerpalooza, the Homecoming Pageant, a Halloween Fundraiser for Breast Cancer Awareness, Clean the World Week, Students for Chihuahua, Battle of I-10 Blood Drive, and the North American Can Food Drive.

SGA is committed to providing services that make a positive contribution to the personal and professional development of the UTEP community. This goal is being achieved through a variety of methods. We are currently collaborating with other student governments concerning the advancement of student needs in higher education on a state (University of Texas Student Advisory Council (UT SAC), and the Texas Student Association (TSA)) and national level (American Student Government Association). The UT SAC and

TSA are extremely important as they unify the voices of all student concerns across Texas, and will signify more presence and leverage in the upcoming Texas Legislative session.

As the SGA, we are interested in the continuity and the efficiency of our Department. Therefore we are currently reviewing all of our binding documents and processes to ensure that not only students, but the UTEP community is well served. Our SGA thinks “out of the box” and evidence of it is our interest in introducing a House of Representatives to our existing structure in order to increase student representation, awareness and participation.

Each cycle is a new and exciting opportunity to enhance the effectiveness of SGA. The work of our members, the input of the students, the advice of UTEP’s Administration and the collaboration with numerous departments has set us on the successful path that we are currently experiencing this year. We are excited about the possibilities we will encounter and numerous milestones we can achieve during this 2008-2009 Administration.

You will find throughout this report that students can do much more than many think; that the student voice is being heard loud and clear, and that you can become part of this wave of progress and opportunity. We wait for you with open doors, an open mind and attentive ears.

**Committee Projects**

- Voice your Choice October 2008: Candidate Forum
  - This event was part of an initiative to engage and educate UTEP students and the El Paso community of the importance of voting. The first part of the event included a panel formed by UTEP professors Dr. Kathleen Staudt, Dr. Genna Gaspare, Dr. Timothy Roth, and student representatives from College Republicans and University Democrats.
  - The second part of the event included a debate between Dee Margo and Joe Moody who were both running for District 78 State Representative. In this debate they discussed their platforms, ideals, and answered questions from students.
  - To put on this event SGA collaborated with Students for Reform, Center for Civic Engagement, Campus Republicans, University Democrats, Campus Activity Board, and Regional Economic Development Association.
- Campus Life
  - Throughout the fall semester, tailgates were hosted in order to promote soccer and football. Food was offered and students were invited to get involved with the spirit of supporting the teams.
  - We also participated and volunteered in numerous activities such as Minerpalooza, Slice of El Paso, Welcome Back Week, Union Open House, Bhutan Festival, Midnight Breakfast, UTEP-UACJ Student Panel, Battle of I-10 blood drive and Secret Santa among many others. Also, in collaboration with the MySGA committee, in many of these events, students were registered to vote in local, state and national elections.
- Expansion of the Swimming and Fitness Center
  - SGA members have been active in the decision making process on the \$32,000,000 expansion of the Swimming and Fitness Center by becoming part of the oversight committee and actively participating in its meetings.

Upcoming Projects

- Miner Week: Student Participation in Campus Events
  - The goal is to increase student involvement on the UTEP campus. The type of entertainment, games, activities, food options and dates are still being discussed. Student input has been essential in the planning of this project. We expect next semester to be very big and exciting for UTEP students.

- Parent Weekend: Parent Involvement on Campus
  - The objective is to develop a weekend where parents of UTEP students can learn how to take an active and supporting role in their son/daughter's college life.

## Student Government Association

- We are expecting to work with the UTEP Parent Association and the Alumni Association to make this happen.
- Greeks Fraternities and Sororities
  - The goal is to provide space for these organizations to showcase their history, their hard work, their colors, symbols, and traditions with other students. This will educate people on the remarkable impact that they have on our community. As statistics show, they are the most involved students on campus and provide a great deal of community service.
- Representation of Student Organizations in SGA
  - SGA is currently analyzing the possibility of the creation of a House of Representatives.
  - The objective is to allow each of the more than 200 student organizations to designate a Representative that will serve in this Chamber. This will enhance the communication of these organizations with SGA, while giving them a voice in SGA's decision making process.
  - It will also allow for the development of a stronger student network, where the collaboration among the students' organizations in numerous activities throughout the year, will enhance student campus life.
  - This would mean that SGA would differ from its current structure, and would create a collective calendar, in order to effectively coordinate with other student organizations and have a greater and better impact on our UTEP and El Paso communities.



## Special Events Committee

### **Committee Projects**

- Homecoming 2008
  - Hosted the Homecoming Pageant, where judges selected the top students from our campus to represent UTEP on the 2008 Homecoming Court. The event had an attendance of more than four hundred people. Several sponsors donated cash, products and prizes to the contestants and helped with the expenses of our pageant.
  - We also hosted the SGA Homecoming Party at Club Myst on October 11, 2008.
- Halloween Fundraiser to Raise Breast Cancer Awareness
  - *Interview with the Vampire* was a party hosted at Club Vanilla. The party allowed students to have fun, by dressing up in costumes while keeping in mind the importance of breast cancer. A portion of the money was donated to the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

### Upcoming Projects

- President's Dinner
  - At this year's event the Student Government Association is working hard to recognize UTEP's outstanding student leaders. Thanks to the support of President Diana Natalicio, this event will be held at the Larry K. Durham Center on Friday, February 27, 2009.
- Awards Banquet
  - Our main goal this year is to recognize the hard work of SGA members, the Top Ten Seniors, as well as faculty and staff that contribute and help SGA throughout the year. The annual SGA banquet will be held at the Camino Real Hotel on Friday, April 17, 2009. We will strive to be respectful of the audience's time and wrap up the event successfully!
- Miner Heroes
  - This series of events aims to recognize UTEP students who have excelled at the state, national and international levels. We hope to host this series every two months beginning February, 2009. We expect the collaboration of the Deans of each college, faculty and different departments to help us with the nomination process.



Parking and Traffic Committee

**Committee Projects**

- Shuttle Services
  - The Parking and Traffic Committee surveyed students on the Miner Metro for ways to better improve our shuttle services. We then modified the shuttle route system with support of the Office of the Vice President for Business Affairs and the Parking and Transportation Department.
  - Recent surveys have shown positive student feedback due to the modification of these routes.
  - We plan to request the support from the College of Engineering in the development of a device at every shuttle stop that provides students with information on the time that the last shuttle stopped at that particular location. This will motivate the students to use more frequently the free shuttle services since they are informed of when the next shuttle will arrive.
- Distribution of flyers
  - In a proactive approach rather than reactive one, SGA is working with the President's Office, and the Department of Parking and Transportation to diminish the concern of neighbors around the UTEP campus.
  - Flyers that include a temporary parking pass in the remote parking lots, have been distributed by SGA members to students as an attempt to inform them of the parking restrictions in neighborhoods.
  - This helps the UTEP community in three ways: First, it reduces the concern of neighbors regarding students parking in their driveways. Second, it allows students to park for free in an area that has enough space, while preventing them from getting a ticket by the El Paso Police Department for parking in the restricted areas. Third, it allows students to get used to riding the free shuttle to their campus destinations.

Upcoming Projects

- Training for Court Justices
  - With a strong conviction to act fair and responsibly in the ticket appeal process, and in conjunction with the Parking and Transportation Department we will be providing a unified training for Justices
  - This will be followed by an access view to the Traffic Court Justices, to the citation database. This will allow Traffic Justices, Prosecutors and Public Defenders to gather all the necessary information for their cases.
- Student Rights
  - We are also working to create a "Student Rights" section in the Parking and Traffic Regulations.



Academic Affairs Committee

**Committee Projects**

- Reduce Text Book Prices Initiative
  - Our textbook initiative intends to reduce the impact of increasing textbook prices on students. In addition, this initiative promotes the reuse of book editions, as new editions usually have few additions or changes.
  - Follett- Bookstore Buy-back program: we noticed that students were receiving low amounts of money for their textbooks. As of 10/22/08 the percentage of professors that had turned in their book list to Follett was 27%.
  - As representatives of the students we raised this concern and thanks to the support of the Bookstore advisory committee, that number was increased to an outstanding 88% as of 11/20/2008. Just in time for the buy-back program.
  - Thus, students have a higher chance that books will be re-used and will receive at least 50% of the book's worth.
  - It is expected that this program, with its increased level of professor involvement, will give about \$1.5 million back to students.
- Additional Computers Initiative
  - Soon to be vacated bookstore location: In our effort to increase the number of computers available to students and to bring more life to the Union, we would like to move the Cyber Café into the location and install 125 to 150 computers.
    - That space consists of about 24,000 square feet, and according to information provided to us by IT, the computer lab would only require between 3000 to 4000 square feet.
    - According to computer labs usage reports, The Cyber Café is 3<sup>rd</sup> in computer utilization across all campus labs.
    - Benefits of this implementation would include, meeting student demand for computers in a centralized location, increased student traffic, increase consumption, and possibility of having more and more student activities housed in the Union.
    - In order to determine the viability of this program, we have collaborated with different offices, including: The Union, IT, Sodexo, Office of the Vice-President for Business Affairs, Office of the Vice-President for Student Affairs, President's Office, Faculty Senate and the Library.
  - 24/7 Lab Access: It is SGA's intention to determine the viability of allowing 24/7 access to the Library's CLC. This, in order to meet student demand for computers and to allow commuter students, Miner Village residents, and those who have irregular or unusual work hours to be able to use these machines in order to complete their school work and enrich their student experience
    - We do not intend to increase the Library's costs dramatically. Instead, we are only looking at having the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Library available to our students.

- In order to determine the viability of this project, we have been meeting with the Directors for IT and the Library.
- USA Today Readership program
  - This Program has the goal of increasing civic engagement, literacy and global awareness by making two major newspapers available to students free of charge.
  - Statistics of the program reveal that a beginning program attracts about 15% of the student population. This number increases as faculty and student awareness of this program increases.
  - The current proposal calls for approximately \$40,000 per semester and we are weighing several financing options including a joint effort between SGA and the Office of Student Affairs, a \$2 optional fee for students, or funding from the Administration.
- Miner Honor Code
  - Meetings with other universities from the UT System, other student governments and current UTEP students has allowed us to discover that an Honor Code would be fundamental for UTEP as it aspires to become a TIER 1 institution.
  - Honor Codes have the benefit of increasing school pride, involvement, and civic engagement. It is important not only to create this Honor Code as a set of rules, but to create the culture that will embrace it. We will work with administrators, faculty and staff in the development and implementation of this Honor Code.
- Student Outreach Via Surveys
  - We are collecting student surveys in order to cover student concerns and to ask them about different initiatives that we have in mind, including: having the CLC at the library available 24/7, an involvement scholarship that would be a joint effort with the Mine Tracker Transcript, and more.
- Language Tutoring to Increase Support to Student
  - Currently the largest college on campus, the College of Liberal Arts requires a foreign language as part of the degree plan. SGA would like to promote the Initiative of tutors for all the foreign language classes, just as we have tutors for English and Math classes.
  - We are currently developing a budget schedule that will determine the cost of implementing one tutor per language. Thus we can begin with the implementation of a few tutors for some key languages that reveal the highest need in Spring 2009.
- Housing Study to Access Students Needs
  - We have conducted a study that compares approximately 50 department complexes to our Miner Village. This study was intended to reveal the financial and non-financial benefits of living on-campus and how much students know about them.
- Mine Tracker Scholarship
  - SDC is planning to pilot the Mine Tracker Transcript, which indicates the different extracurricular activities that a student has participated in throughout their college careers.
  - In order to increase student involvement and to recognize those students that, because of their participation, allow this University to thrive, the Student Government Association would like to establish a scholarship.
  - Amounts and financing alternatives are to be determined, as we will meet with the different Dean's, the Scholarships office, and the Student Development Center to create a final strategy.

### **Committee Projects**

- New and Transfer Student Orientation
  - Set up a table at every New and Transfer Student Orientation to explain what SGA is and its function to incoming freshman and transfer students.
  - Registered freshmen for the SGA Excel program and registered students to vote in local, state and national elections.
- Welcome Back Week
  - SGA members took shifts to interact with students and explain the role and function of SGA and how we are here to serve them.
- Minerpalooza
  - SGA sponsored \$2500 to this event and had a table set up to take student surveys, register individuals to vote and to record students for a video for the Homecoming Pageant.
- SGA Forms
  - Created and updated SGA Forms to include updated logos, easier to read information and electronic version. Updated forms included Fax cover, Election Application, Personnel Application and Ad-Hoc Committee Application.
- Graphic Designs
  - Created a t-shirt design for the Committee for Campus Quality “Go Green and Live Clean”, and logos for all the Ad-Hoc Committees of SGA.
- SGA Office Clean House
  - Committee members worked all semester to create a positive office appeal by cleaning up the office, clearing out supply closets, and recycling old items that were no longer of use. In addition to this, two PC’s and one Mac computer became available to our SGA thanks to the support of the IT Department.
  - SGA purchased new furniture for the reception for the first time in over ten years, had the office painted and is currently in the process of getting an Audio Visual system installed in the SGA Conference Room. This was possible thanks to the support of Union Services.
- UTEP SGA Website:
  - Added current pictures of the 2008-2009 SGA Staff and Administration, election results, an online calendar of events, current minutes, and a letter from our current President and advisor.
  - Changed the URL from <http://studentaffairs.utep.edu/Default.aspx?tabid=1696> to [www.utep.edu/sga](http://www.utep.edu/sga) and crated the email address sga@utep.edu in order to enhance communication with our students. This was done in collaboration with the Information Technology Department.
- My SGA Request Form
  - Created a form to get every committee’s events at least a month prior in order to start publicizing and ironing out the details of the event(s).

Upcoming Projects

- Event Notebook
  - Create an online notebook that will contain all upcoming event information so that we are able to keep students up to date on SGA events.
- Bills
  - Create and update methods of applying for Bills, as well as adding New Bill templates, new forms to fill out and a notification system. Adding appropriation funds to website on a monthly basis
- New Public Relations Strategy
  - We will work closely with The Prospector, University Communications and the Department of Communications to publicize and promote all committee and SGA events to the best of our abilities. SGA has worked very hard this year for the students, and is time to share our accomplishments with them.
- SGA Open House
  - In this event we will be inviting students, departments, faculty and staff, to experience the new office once the remodeling is completed.



Excel Committee

**Committee Projects**

- The Revival of the Committee
  - This committee was revived to educate and equip 25 freshmen with the necessary leadership skills to succeed at The University of Texas at El Paso.
- Semester Activities
  - The members had an opportunity to practice their leadership skills in a variety of events including SGA projects, university organizations and university events.
  - The students participated in a University-wide scavenger hunt to familiarize themselves with university departments, faculty, staff and, of course, the university's rich history.
- Minerpalooza-
  - They were assigned the task of putting together the SGA Homecoming float. They were given twenty three days and a budget of \$1,000 and were able to achieve the success of the Coach's Most Spirited Float Award.
- Volunteer Events-
  - They participated in events such as the Mother Daughter Program Open House, which they facilitated a workshop on leadership.
  - They also volunteered for Spooktacular, a Reynolds's House event and the Rescue Mission Thanksgiving.

Upcoming Projects

- Volunteer Events-
  - The excel members will familiarize themselves with SGA documents such as Constitution, By Laws, Appropriation Guidelines and Election Code.
  - They will be visiting various departments, key administration and organizations around campus as well as having an open dialogue between their Dean and their Collegiate Senator.
  - They will also coordinate and facilitate the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual West Texas Leadership Conference which is a regional leadership conference for middle level and high school students with the guidance of last year's coordinator.
- Structure and Continuity
  - The Excel program trains and fosters the next generation of SGA members as members of Excel will be encouraged to run for office in April of 2009.
- National Conference
  - Another hope is to receive funding to send a select number of students to the National Collegiate Leadership Conference at the University of Arizona in February 2009.



Committee for Campus Quality

Progress Report

### **Committee Projects**

- Go Green Program
  - Among our committees' most important projects and events, we have organized the "Clean the World Week", Tailgate Clean-Ups and we have participated in the "Chill Out" competition.
  - Clean the World Week was an initiative to increase awareness of the importance of caring for our environment. In this effort, we set up an information table in the Union Breezeway, flyers about recycling were distributed and we encouraged by-passers to recycle in our five containers that were available to us through Facilities Services.
  - For the "Chill Out" competition, we submitted a 500 word essay on some of the efforts that UTEP has furthered in order to reduce our carbon footprint.
  - The committee has also made recommendations to the Provost's office to reduce the printing of university catalogs and course schedules. The suggestion included placing the university catalogs on CD and/or online and printing 30% of the current number of course schedules.
  - In the Spring 2009 semester, we will compete in Recyclemania, which is a national recycling competition. Rules and more information is available at [www.recyclemaniacs.org](http://www.recyclemaniacs.org).
  - We are developing ideas to provide and establish transportation alternatives. These include increasing the number of bike racks available to students, placing bike lockers and eventually implementing a bike rental program on campus.
- Food Services
  - Worked with Sodexo and the Office of the Vice-President of Business Affairs to implement competitive market prices in the newly opened WOW, taking in account our students' budget.
  - In addition, we completed Surveys that asked what kind of food that students would like to become available. The most relevant finding was the need of vegetarian options, which could lead to the implementation of a salad bar.
  - A future project seeks to provide students with information on how to better balance their diets. This would include providing a nutritional guide on food products.

- Disabled Students
  - We have held meetings with different students from the Disabled Student Services Office in order to discuss their needs and how SGA could serve to fulfill those needs and improve conditions for disabled students.
  - We have completed surveys on how UTEP could improve in regards to accessibility for disabled students. We are currently researching areas and buildings that need improvements in order to allow accessibility for all students.
  - It was settled that special tutoring for disabled students had to be conducted by a disabled person in order to promote a comfortable environment.
  - In addition, we are developing a program that will educate the UTEP community on the importance of respecting and supporting our disabled students.
  - Finally, more support needs to be directed to the Disabled Students Services Office in order to completely fulfill the needs of our disabled students, and they should be taken more into consideration when planning and building new facilities.

Ways and Means Standing Committee

## **Committee Report**

- A New Approach to the Appropriation Guidelines
  - Decreased the time of the appropriation process, in which the student turns in his bill and no later than 3 weeks after that day he would have his/her money.
  - This is possible thanks to the elimination of a second reading to the Senate and greater collaboration to sign the bill between the President, the Vice-President of Internal Affairs, the Dean of Students and the administrative assistant after the bill is passed by the Senate.
- Individual and Organizations Bills
  - In the 2008 Summer Session we went over 19 Bills and for the 2008 fall session we have gone over 45 Bills. Working with representatives of the different 64 Bills, making sure they meet our eligibility standards.

## Upcoming Projects

- In collaboration with the Documents Review Committee we will work in restructuring our by-laws and appropriation guidelines in order to properly state appropriation times, and interpretations of certain sections of these documents.
- In conjunction with MySGA we plan to create Bill templates for students to simply download the form from our website and fill it out for their own bill information, making the writing of a Bill more accessible to all the students.

## **Committee Report**

- Budget
  - The 2008-2009 Student Senate received a budget of \$68,200.00 dollars, which was divided into \$30,000.00 dollars for the 2008 fall semester, \$30,000.00 dollars for the 2009 spring semester and \$8,200.00 dollars for the 2009 summer session.
- Summer 2008
  - This Student Senate appropriated a total of \$ 10,448.81 dollars during the 2008 summer session. Monies for this session came from the previous administration
  - \$1,000.00 dollars where appropriated to individual students traveling to different places including Paris, France, and Salt lake City, Utah. The resting \$9,448.81 where appropriated to different organizations, mainly for travel.
- Fall 2008
  - We appropriated \$27,191.00 dollars to different organizations and individuals including fraternities and students that where representing our school in national or international conferences.
  - \$2,210.00 dollars benefited nine individual students who represented UTEP in different conferences, just to name a few, the 2008 MRS Fall Meeting in Boston, Massachusetts or the 7<sup>th</sup> Student Organization of North America Conference held in Monterrey, Mexico.
  - The remaining \$24,981.00 dollars had a greater campus impact, as those monies where appropriated to different organizations for different events.
  - Campus events included a food drive, conferences, and cinema presentations. Organizations also traveled to places like Chicago, Illinois and Lima, Peru for different conferences.

## Upcoming Sessions

- Spring 2009
  - We plan to appropriate \$29,000.00 dollars plus the monies left from the fall semester, making a total of \$30,809.00 dollars.
  - Pay for student elections, for which, we had created a special budget, subtracting \$1,000.00 dollars from each of the semester sessions and the summer, making a total of \$3,000.00 dollars for the Student Elections.
- Summer 2009
  - We are leaving the 2009-2010 SGA administration a budget of \$7,200.00 dollars for the 2009 summer session.
